# TRADE MADE

What do the Trade Apprentices do with their skills for themselves? We want to show other apprentices, engineers, etc the modifications that Trade Apprentices are making to their bikes, cars, environment, or the objects they make in their spare time.

### EXHIBITIONS

Raymond Ansin 1 – 19 February "Two Years of Contemplation."

Born July, 1949, Ansin began painting in Palmerston North in 1968. In 1970 he moved to Wellington to work as a scientific glassblower. Many works in glass were constructed and sold, however after three years he began painting again - in acrylic.

With the encouragement of several prominent N.Z. artists he struggled along for two years gaining a basic foundation in the understanding of the medium.

He travelled to U.S.A. and England, studied both public and private art collections, and painted for four months in Sussex.

On his return to Wellington assembled his first solo exhibition.

He now lives in Runanga, Westland and has attempted full time painting with financial assistance from an English patron. The year in Runanga has seen the occurence of many realizations concerning art, and its effect on the artist. The relative isolation from outside art influences have caused his work to show stronger fellings of detachment - a constant battle of the artists' search for identity in a lonely world, alone in space, with many lonely people.

# George Kojis (Ceramic Artist) 2 - 21 February

Born Wisconsin, U.S.A., 1942, George Kojis graduated BFA, University of Wisconsin, and MFA Tyler School of Art, Temple University.

"My work represents an involvement with clay and my reflections on an environment closely aligned to change."

George is an artist for whom pottery is one of several outlets for his primary interest – visual expression. He has exhibited in North America and N.Z. where his works are held in many public and private collections. During the past few years he has been conducting ceramic workshops in various parts of N.Z., and at the same time producing vessels from his garage studio in Wellington.

#### Paul Thompson (Photographs) 5 - 25 February

Paul Thompson was born in Christchurch in 1951, worked for the National Film Unit for several years, is represented in N.Z. and Australian collections, and likes taking photographs.

He says, "as a photograph (objectively speaking) is but a single instance in a continium of moments I look upon my current work as a distillation of these moments/reality."
