



# 1979 C.S.A. Guthrey Travel Award for Art

- The object of the Award is to enable a promising or established artist to visit and study in Australia.
- 2. The award will take the form of an economy class return air passage from Christchurch to Sydney by Air New Zealand, and accommodation in Australia. Total value \$400.00. Plus a sum of NZ\$400.00 towards the cost of travelling within Australia. The winner will be required to meet all other expenses and stay in Australia for not less than three weeks. Reservations for air flights and accommodation must be made 35 days before departure with A.R. Guthrey Travel & Shipping Limited.
- 3. To be eligible, applicants must be resident in Canterbury or must be working members or associate members or student members of the Canterbury Society of Arts. For the purpose of this regulation Canterbury is defined as the territory bounded by the Clarence and Waitaki Rivers.
- 4. Applications from eligible persons must be made in writing to the Secretary of the Canterbury Society of Arts, P.O. Box 772, Christchurch, and in the Secretary's hands by 3.00 p.m. on the 21st July 1979 and should be made on the proper form obtainable from the Secretary. Four photostat copies of the application for the use of the Selection Committee should be sent to:

The Secretary, Canterbury Society of Arts, P.O. Box 772, CHRISTCHURCH.

- 5. The Travel Award will be granted by the Council of the Canterbury Society of Arts on the Recommendation of a committee which shall consist of:
  - a) The President of the Canterbury Society of Arts or his Deputy.
  - b) Mr A.R. Guthrey or his nominee as recommended by the President of the Society.
  - c) An appointed member of the Council of the Society of Arts.

Provided that no award be made should the committee so resolve.

- 6. The name of the winner shall be announced on the 10th August 1979 and the successful applicant must undertake to visit and study in Australia within a period of twelve months of the award being made or it will lapse.
- 7. Introductions will be arranged by the Canterbury Society of Arts.
- 8. On returning to New Zealand, the winner will be required to present a full report to the Canterbury Society of Arts, giving a full account of the time used, the studies made and any conclusions reached or impressions formed which are held to be of value for New Zealand artists.

The winner will also be required, if requested by the Council of the Canterbury Society of Arts, to write a brief account of his or her visit for publication in the Canterbury Society of Arts "News" and if the nature of his researches is suitable to give a lecture or to participate in a discussion, the object of which will be to make available the benefits of the award to members, students and others interested. Such lecture or discussion will be arranged by the Canterbury Society of Arts.

#### An Overdue Appreciation

I was living on the Cashmere Hills - some years ago when I first saw how a sensitively aware architect could restore and almost reconstruct, the dear old St. Augustines Church, while retaining and enhancing its original character; and when years later as a member of the Catholic Cathedral Conservation Committee I witnessed at first-hand how the same architect brought our neglected Basilica back to life, but with an added beauty and dignity. I realised how fortunate we all were in this city to have such skills - and yet - what has finally urged me to write this letter - is the continuing pleasure I find in the exquisite contrast that exists between the mass and textural strength of the Town Hall, - and the delicacy of the Fountain! How easy and perhaps - how disastrous? - it could have been to commission some abstract shapes - or figures - using water as a secondary factor, dribbling from a few holes or pipes! I am aware that the Architect was not the first to use a "dandelion clock" theme for a fountain - but how graceful the interpretation by Warren and Mahoney! I even enjoy the vision on cold grey winter days when the black linear structures, denuded of their veil of water, stand like a group of graphic drawings in space - related to the bone structure of the leafless trees waiting for their spring and summer beauty to be born anew. Then the fountains will come alive with sparkle and glitter - and if we are blessed wear a rainbow to complement their trembling iewels!

Thank you Warren and Mahoney and your talented staff, for all the beauty you have given, and are continuing to give to us - in the City of Christchurch.



#### **Painting Workshops**

Two painting courses to be held at the CSA Gallery with tutor Errol Shaw. Each course is separate and complete. Both courses will be illustrated with slides of relevant paintings.

Students may enrol for both courses which compliment each other.

(1) AN INTRODUCTION TO PAINTING Saturday, August 11 and Sunday, August 12 10 - 12 a.m. and 1 - 4.30 p.m. each day

Drawing and essential skills for exploring visual ideas to be organised into painting. An introduction into using and developing skills of handling paint. Drawing will be the basis from which ideas can eventuate into painting. Although certain fundamentals of painting will be taught students will be encouraged to develop their own style.


(2) COMPOSITION; STILL LIFE
Monday, August 13 and Tuesday, August 14,
10 - 12 a.m. and 1 - 4.30 p.m. each day

Developing and organising ideas of painting into a composition. Emphasis will be on the structure of painting and colour composition. The still life will be the basis from which the student will study the principles of composition of which can be applied to other subjects.

For both courses students should bring at least four assorted brushes, the basic range of colours (acrylics are prefered for class work since they are versatile and dry quickly), four sheets of cartridge paper, pencils, charcoal and at least two primed boards (hardboard) or canvas (about 35 x 40 cm). Newsprint available at CSA.







Born 1929. New Zealander.


6th July - 22nd July

I see my searches and attemp to combine the exhilaration of line with the massive impact of colour. Drawing in any medium is all important to me. I sketch constantly from life, am obsessed by movement, be it human and physical the rush of implied forms present in all visual experience.

I move at present in a world halfway between figurative and totally abstract seeking to extract the essence and reduce to essentials.



#### **Brian Frazer**

Is an amateur artist with a technical background but little formal training. He has been painting in his spare time for the last 4 years and his interest in river fishing has inclined him towards the subject of his first show.

The works exhibited were executed over the past year and reflect his observations of light on water and the interaction of waterways and the landscape.

The various layers of the river: bed, bulk and surface; show light being reflected, refracted, polarised and shaded; in constantly changing patterns. In the broader view; the river changes and is changed by, the landform; in patterns indicated by the reflected light.


#### **Tony Fomison**

Thelma Payne has had seven years advanced tuition from leading Japanese, English, New Zealand and American tutors. She began potting seriously in 1975 after building double chambered diesel kiln. Produces mainly stoneware with some porcelain. Finds the discipline of domestic ware a grand contrast after making large sculptured pieces.

She says, "inspirations come from riding back country bush trails and mountain streams all my life. I get totally involved in every process. I am intrigued by the sensuous and expressive qualities of clay. Teaching gives me a positive attitude, constantly giving the urge to create something personal from the elements. To love life through one's work is to be intimate with lifes innermost secret."

#### Jo Floyd - Weaving

29 July - 11 August

Jo Floyd spent one year at the Churchdown Institute, London, and has exhibited and been guest weaver at Chelsea (Eng.) Wanaka, Timaru, Invercargill, and Oamaru. She has spent fifteen months in Europe.

Of her work she says, "during period of instruction worked with a variety of media and produced a wide range of weaving varying from fine materials in silk and linen to coarse woollen goods. Rapidly came to prefer the natural fibre wool and strive to use it to express my feeling and interpretations through the use of bold design and richness of colour. I respect and admire weaving of bedouins and traditional perwian work. I strive to express same quality of colour, design in a contemporary manner. I aim to gain a technical perfection in weaving, to extend the use of wool in my specialisation of floor rugs and wall-hangings."

The Club was founded by the late Frank Gross. who taught art in many parts of Canterbury, to allow his pupils from the various groups to meet for their mutual benefit. The objects of the Club therefore are to organise painting days, tuition and exhibitions, with each group holding painting days during the year and acting as host in its own district.

#### **Don Thornley**

Born 1936 30 August - 13 September

Diploma of Teaching 1958. Worked in Len Castle's workshop 1970 - 71. Member of N.Z.S.P. & A.S.P. since 1972. Exhibited regularly in group exhibitions in Auckland, Wellington and New Plymouth. Represented in the Auckland Museum and Waikato Fine Arts Gallery collections. References to work in N.Z. Pottery workbook, Author Howard Williams, "Potters in New Zealand" published by N.Z.S.P. and in a book on "Sculpture in N.Z."soon to be published by Peter Cape. One man exhibition Alicat Gallery 1977. Travelling exhibition of twenty New Zealand Potters to China, Korea and Japan in 1975.

"I value very much the attitude to clay evident in the Iga, Buzen, and Shigaralei ware of Japan. A more personal involvement in recent years has been forms, monolithic, simple and with a strong presence and of minimal functional interest. Made with large slabs of clay, the source of inspiration often coming from the sculpture of the Post World 11 period".



Because many women artists in New Zealand have for a long time worked in isolation and unrecognised in a predominantly male controlled art world there is a need for women's art groups devoted exclusively to the interests and promotion of women in the arts.

At the National Art Gallery we see the need for a 'Womens Art Archive' to be developed along similar lines as the Australian 'Women's Art Register' in

Principally the 'Women's Art Archive' will be a collection of slides and photographs of the work of New Zealand women artists covering all the visual media. It will be open, without selection, to any woman who wishes to be represented in the collection.

In addition there will also be a collection of relevant articles, addresses, exhibition brochures and information on file on women's art groups and festivals both in New Zealand and overseas and on women working in ceramics, crafts, painting, drawing and filmmaking.

The 'Women's Art Archive' will subscribe to New Zealand and overseas journals relevant to women in the arts.

We hope to put out newsletters as frequently as news relevant to women in the arts becomes available and the Women's Art Archive develops and requires it. - This will probably mean a newsletter every second month. Women who are not on our mailing list and would like to receive the newsletter should write to:-


