The Hurunui District Council in Association with the Amuri Sub Branch of the Christchurch RSA are pleased to announce this Competition, which will be exhibited at the CSA during August. Winning pieces from this exhibition will form part of the national 'New Zealand Remembers' project.

Entry forms are now available at the Gallery. Works should depict either Charles Upham as a person or some event with which he was closely related. The first prize award is \$1,000, second \$400 and third \$200. Receiving Day is Friday 28 July in Culverden.

International Workshop of Indian Art and Culture

Registration information is available at the CSA for this workshop to be held in Pachmarhi, a forested mountain region of India, from 25 November to 25 December 1995.

Topics include Dance, Music, Visual Arts and Yoga. Fifty places are available, with a further six reserved on a scholarship basis. The workshop has grown from the vision of Ashish Shrivastva, a visual artist, who has striven to create an authentic Indian Arts Village where people from all over the globe can live, learn and explore the richness of Indian Arts through practical participation. Courses are structured to be of value to all participants, from introductory to advanced level, and applications close on 29 June 1995.







THE CSA SPECIAL MEETING

FROM THE PRESIDENT:

I am taking this opportunity in PREVIEW to thank those members who attended the Special Meeting on 27 April and those who took the time and trouble to write in response to the Notice of that Meeting.

Over one hundred attended, which made it the largest Meeting in my time with the CSA. Over fifty wrote in response - most of you with quite detailed suggestions as to what could be considered for the future. I summarised most of the suggestions in my opening remarks at the meeting.

As you will be aware from your copy of the minutes, it was firstly resolved that the Council negotiate a disposal of the Permanent Collection to the Christchurch Civic Art Gallery Trust at a fair value. We hope to be able to report on those negotiations in the next PREVIEW.

It was also resolved at the Meeting that, for the time being, our building at 66 Gloucester Street should not be sold, but that a Steering Committee be appointed out of the body of the Meeting.

The Steering Committee has met twice and the discussions have been vigorous and progressive. The Committee has started with a clean sheet of paper, the resolutions of the Meeting and the Members' feedback. The direction of the Committee's discussion has been toward defining the current aspirations of the Society, and considering in specific terms how best to quickly establish an economic trading base to support those aspirations.

I hope to report in more detail the progress of the Steering Committee in the next PREVIEW.
