Jennifer Quérée

A degree in anthropology, membership of the Canterbury Museum Archaeological Society and three years as a student worker at the museum in the seventies led to Jennifer's present position as Curator in Canterbury History. With a personal interest in ceramics Jennifer also took over responsibility for European Decorative Arts in 1987 and this interest culminated after "three years in the making" in the Royal Doulton Exhibition, which Jennifer curated and for which she wrote the associated book Royal Doulton, Illustrated with Treasures from New Zealand and Australia. Jennifer has shown a continuing interest in the work of the Canterbury Potters Association and we are very pleased that she is to open our 1993 exhibition.

Guest Exhibitors

Sally Connolly

Sally graduated from Canterbury University with a Diploma in Fine Arts and worked with clay for the first time during a year spent at Auckland Teachers' College. This was followed some years later by very stimulating classes with Yvonne Rust at her Colombo Street Studio in 1965-66.

From the beginning, the freedom found in handbuilding has been the main fascination and Sally is currently working on a variety of forms in raku, stoneware and porcelain.

Sally exhibits regularly throughout New Zealand and so far this year her work has been exhibited for Craft '93 at the Cave Rock Gallery, the NZSP Royal Easter Show in Auckland and the NZSP Cleveland Ceramic Award Exhibition in Dunedin,.

Rena Jarosewitsch

Rena emigrated from Germany in 1983 after completing her training at the Glasfachschule Rheinbach. Since 1984 she has worked as a freelance glass artist and operates her business from her own studio in the Christchurch Arts Centre. She is also a parttime tutor at the Christchurch Polytechnic School of Art and Design.

Much of Rena's output comprises architectural commissions for public buildings, churches and private homes and her work has been exhibited widely in New Zealand and abroad. She is currently working for a solo exhibition at *Gaslerie* in Hamburg,

Germany later this year.

Rena's latest works are fused and slumped decorative glass platters, fabricated in the mosaic technique. The *Pacifica* platter series draws on ornamental patterns, often associated with Maori art, set against a background of bright, intense colour, so apparent in Aoteoroa.

Of her work Rena writes:

Being involved in a creative pursuit that I find personally very rewarding, gives me the inspiration and energy to build on existing knowledge and to keep venturing into new areas of interest within my chosen field. In addition to imagination and concept design and development, working with glass, due to its fragile and sometimes unpredictable nature requires discipline and patience above and beyond a sound technical knowledge base that is achieved thorough application over years of experience. Despite all the long hours there is nothing like the joy and satisfaction that is derived from a piece that works well. "

David Lewis

David was born and educated in the USA, graduated from Notre Dame in 1970 and has lived in New Zealand since 1974. From 1977 until 1991 David worked at the Totara Vale pottery which he established in Le Bons Bay. He now lives in Christchurch and works as a full time potter and designer. The glazes used on his pots are based on materials found in Banks Peninsula, the terracotta clay used for planters comes from a Peninsula source and the designs grow out of the Peninsular experience.

An important aspect of David's creative life is teaching - from all age groups at Risingholme Community Centre, to workshops ranging from "kiln use" to "expanding abilities with clay" and in 1989 as a visiting artist to three high schools in Regensburg, Germany. David's work is represented in galleries and collections throughout New Zealand and he has undertaken several large commissions for corporations and restaurants. His centerpiece fountain *Falling Water* can be seen in the Forbes Centre Tower Building.
