## Opening night sales procedure and collection of purchased pots

There will be no sales until after the formal opening by Jo Giles.

Four sales attendants wearing coloured hats will be stationed in the gallery near the pots for which they are responsible. They have a numbered sales card for each of these pieces.

An intending purchaser should collect the sales card bearing the number of the item being purchased and the sales attendant will mark the piece with a red sticker.

The sales card MUST be presented at the Sales Desk before 7pm and a minimum deposit of 10% paid. A receipt will be issued and this must be presented when the piece is collected. If any Sales Cards are not handed in by 7pm those pieces will be regarded as unsold and their red stickers removed.

Work may be collected from the gallery on Sunday, August 23 between 3.30 and 4.30pm. Bring your receipt and the balance of payment. Uncollected pots will be removed to the Courtyard Pottery, 75 Rutland Street and may be collected during the following week.

Around 7.30pm we will be holding an auction of bowls made by members and donated for the occasion. Successful bidders may claim their pieces on the spot by paying the full cost or may pay a deposit and collect them on August 23. The auctioneer will be Dave Barr.

### Roger Chaplin - Canterbury

"I became interested in pottery while I was studying Fine Arts in 1970. Christchurch has a very strong pottery culture in the early 1970's and I was lucky enough to get involved.

In 1973 I shifted to Coalgate where I built and fired diesel, coal and wood fired kilns using traditional stoneware and salt glazing techniques with varying degrees of success.  
In 1980 I shifted back to Christchurch where I adapted to an electric kiln until 1985 when I started to experiment with pit firing and low temperature fuming effects to obtain the various

results that I was seeking.

In the last year we have built a workshop in a quiet rural area of the Port Hills where I am now firing gas and electric kilns and still experimenting with low temperature techniques to produce my current range of pottery."

### Darryl Robertson - Nelson

Darryl is New Zealand's most celebrated young potter. An AN-ZAC Fellowship Study Award to study in Australia was followed by selection, along with such distinguished potters as Len Castle, and Barry Brickell to contribute to New Zealand's exhibit at the World Expo in Seville. Exposure at Seville brought him international recognition and he has since exhibited in the Netherlands, Australia, Switzerland, France, Germany and Italy. Darryl was appointed Cultural Ambassador on an invited visit to exhibit in Japan. Awards include the NZ Innovation Craft Award, NZSP National Exhibition Award, NZ Major Creative Development Grant, and the Gold Medal for Creative Ceramics, Vallaruis, France.

## The Canterbury Potters Association (Inc.)

We are a 35 year old association with about 130 members in Christchurch and the rest of Canterbury. We are a sociable group, interested in all aspects of pottery and we welcome members who wish to learn more about our craft.

The Rooms are in a garden setting in Memorial Avenue near the Commodore Motor Inn and are open to the public every Thursday from 11 - 1.30.

We offer pottery classes during each school term and classes for young people after school and in the vacations. The classes, in which many Christchurch potters have started off, cater for both experienced potters and absolute beginners. All the classes are open to non- members.

Each year we present a major exhibition of members' work in a city gallery and during the year a variety of more social events like our outdoor raku firings and regional Potters Olympics.

We have facilities for a wide range of pottery techniques. These include two electric kilns gas kiln, electric & kick wheels, a 4" extruder, glaze spray booth, and an extensive library which includes a collection of videos. The technical facilities are all available to member on payment of a small annual fee which entitles them to a key to the workshop.

Throughout the year we offer meetings on specialist topics, and present hands-on and demonstration schools by New Zealand and overseas potters.

We publish a lively newsletter, *The Canterbury Potter*, with information about coming events and articles of technical and general interest.
