FOREWORD

The rapid development of the art of pottery making in this country since the First New Zealand Potters' Exhibition held in Dunedin in 1957 has been phenomenal. Bernard Leach, probably the world's most famous artist potter who visited this country in 1962, said recently in Paris that of all the young countries, the pottery movement in New Zealand was the most vigorcus.

One reason for this is undoubtedly the New Zealand temperament, still not far removed from the pioneer, which enjoys making something useful out of the raw materials to hand, and enjoys also the elemental battle of learning to control clay and fire. Another reason is the fact that most of the potters are close friends and help each other with the many technical problems involved. The recent location and utilisation of excellent clays, and the technological advances made in the evolving and controlling of oil fired kilns all add up to an increasing sureness which is reflected in the pots in this exhibition.

Without an informed and interested public the potter could not survive. The connoisseur and the collector of pots has helped tremendously in the building of the pottery movement into a vital force in the community. Wellington has earned the reputation of being a most discriminating and knowledgeable centre in this regard, as proved by the number of pottery exhibitions which have been held here already this year.

The exhibition was last seen in Wellington in 1958, and since then has been held in turn in Napier, Auckland, Christchurch, Palmerston North and Dunedin. It has had no fixed structure, but has evolved itself, held together by the magazine The New Zealand Potter, Now, however, it has grown so large that the New Zealand Society of Potters has been formed, the sole condition of entry into which is the ability to produce pots that satisfy the Selection Committee, which changes every year. The aim of the Society is to look after the interests of potters in general, and to make sure that the Exhibition maintains a high standard. Usually at least 60 per cent. of the pots submitted are rejected. The actual work of running the Exhibition is done by a local Committee set up specially for the purpose, with the assistance of the local Potters' Association. The fact that each year the Exhibition is run by virtually a new Committee with no funds to draw on, in some ways gives strength and fresh ideas, and in other ways makes for difficulties. It is planned that the New Zealand Society will give some form of continuity of control and simplify the financial situation by building up some capital with which to run these large Exhibitions.

New Zealand and Australia are in a unique position for the development of pottery into a vital art form. Japan is the source of many of the ideas on which the modern movement is based and with this country we have a strong and growing basic contact. Too often, in other forms of expression, we trail behind the world with a superficial and watered-down version of the European tradition. But with pottery here and now something is happening which is alive and exciting, and we are all involved.
