



SELECTORS COMMENTS

From 287 entries submitted, 182 were accepted, representing the work of 93 potters.

The standard of work submitted was impressive and a lot of thought had to be given to many works which, though well crafted and sensitively conceived, in the final analysis did not quite measure up to the rigorous standards of a major national exhibition.

Though recognising that the process of selection is essentially subjective, we agreed that we were looking for authority, for energy and for sensitivity towards the materials used.

We found that the final decisions were the most difficult, particularly where we had to choose which of the two prizewinners should come first, where comparing the classic timeless simplicity of the one with the contemporary vitality and immediacy of the other was almost asking the impossible.

This contrast we saw as representing the strength of New Zealand ceramics.

BRONWYNNE CORNISH

At the heart of the matter is clay, the best teacher I've ever had. But more than just the material are all the attendant tasks it involves. Recycling the clay, drying it out on bats, sieving, wedging, stirring, scraping, gathering materials for firings, talking to other potters about all of this. Working with clay is a very enveloping process, and then it is such a willing material, it will try anything you will; it can be burnt, wet down, poured, cut, squeezed, pressed, made to look like lizard skin, sponge or wood. In fact any guise can be assumed, but only if the elemental quartet is employed -

EARTH/AIR/WATER/FIRE.

The other part of my work is more about my own personal characteristics and interests. By nature an inquisitive impatient person who loves surprises. A fascination with the Neolithic, and the animalistic side of our natures, the spiritual dimension, repetition, ritual, symmetry and the creation of atmosphere, are all factors in my installation work.

Making and gathering the elements for these installations takes up much of my working time, but the "golden" moment for me is "setting up". This is when the wheels are set in motion, the key turns in the lock, the door opens - has the alchemy worked?

Clay has been my path for a long time now, and if I ever stop, shade my eyes, gaze into the distance - the road stretches on.


