From throughout New Zealand, 150 entries from 81 potters were submitted for this Exhibition. I have selected 56 entries from 42 potters, for showing. Within this selection, most construction techniques and glazing and firing methods are encompassed by the potters' individual genres and styles.

This diversity shows not only the infinite possibilities which clay, glaze and fire can give, but also allows the maker to express their personality and ideas with ultimate sensitivity.

Many of the works not selected for this exhibition would happily stand in local exhibitions, but for the New Zealand Society of Potters' Annual National Exhibition the selection criteria needs to be more severe to retain a higher standard.

I congratulate the successful entrants and hope those who were unsuccessful this time will continue to strive for future exhibitions.

Clay is tactile and malleable, seductive and infuriating. Once fired, the results can last for millennia. We as makers have a responsibility to do the best we can with the material. In 1,000 years our civilization may be judged on the fired clay objects we have left behind.
